That's why our Sweet Dreams Shelter is here – to put an end to the nightmare of living in a car, or even worse, on the street.

This year's Sweet Dreams campaign is critical to those we serve, like little Libby in the photo. We are seeing more women and children that have been sleeping in their cars or on the street. Recently, an entire family came to us – mother, father and children – who had been calling their car home.





Challenging times because of the pandemic – a struggling economy, rising costs, layoffs and cut-backs – affect everyone, but the ones that are hardest hit are those that can least afford it. Too often, it's single parent families, like Kianna and her daughter in the photo, that are most severely affected. And

Rosie Martina 2020 Golden Deeds Winner

Long-time member and St. Vincent de Paul Top Hat Hall of Fame recipient Rosie Martina has been named the 2020 Golden Deeds Award winner! Rosie will be honored on November 10th with the award, established by the Inter-Civic Council of Greater Baton Rouge and The Advocate to recognize hard-working volunteers for their good works.

Rosie was nominated for the award by Keith Horcasitas, whose wife, Maria Horcasitas, volunteered for many years alongside Rosie to pick up donated food items from local grocery stores for the St. Vincent de Paul meals.

In 1982, Rosie was among volunteers who founded the first St. Vincent de Paul Dining Room, which originally opened in a shotgun house on South 21st Street, and only served 20 to 50 people a day. No menu was prepared in advance, since the meals were based on the donated items that were left on the back porch each morning. 


New Emergency Shelter Project Construction Completed & Opened

Despite the pandemic, we were able to complete construction

on our new 3,500 square foot building on the St. Vincent de Paul Campus. It opened and was prepared to serve the homeless for Tropical Storm Christobal, but, fortunately, as we know Christobal did not affect our area. This exercise prepared us for Hurricane Laura, when we were able to provide shelter for ten single individuals and two families (a family of 3 and family of 4).

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but they know their lives have been turned upside down. Their worlds have collapsed, and the adults they trusted to take care of them are struggling with an enemy they have never faced before – homelessness during a worldwide pandemic.

Thank God, St. Vincent de Paul is here to let them know that someone cares enough about them to provide a home, safety and food until their lives can return to normal.

So many homeless mothers, fathers and children need our help, and this year's Sweet Dream's effort is more important than ever. The poorest families in our community have been hit hard by the pandemic and the struggling economy. This is the perfect storm. Without our shelter, the homeless individuals and families we served would have had no place to call home and be safe. As the temperatures begin to drop, the important night service will become even more critical, especially during freeze nights.

During the day, our shelter provides the additional space to spread out. St. Vincent de Paul is continuing our commitment (even during a pandemic) to sheltering our most vulnerable residents. This new program is helping us, not only to provide shelter, but also critical case management and other services, which are essential to successfully giving a hand-up to self-sufficiency and permanent housing. An official ribbon-cutting has been delayed due to the pandemic, but will be happening in the near future.

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its third location at 222 St. Vincent de Paul Place and serves over 200 to 450 hot meals a day at lunchtime and an equal amount of brown bag suppers. Last year, over 260,000 meals were served.

Rosie has many fond memories of the early days of the St. Vincent de Paul Dining Room. He and his beloved wife, Laura, worked side by side serving the poor and homeless at our Dining Room for many years. Rosie remembers the other founders of the program – Fred Griggs, Vernon Broussard, Marvin Ourso, Bill LeBlanc, Jewel Newman, Claude Doucet, and a long list of others, worked together to make this food ministry a reality.

Rosie has been active in his local St. Jude St. Vincent de Paul Conference ministry, which does a great job of serving the poor. In the early days of that effort, Rosie and Laura began with a food pantry in their garage. Rosie's daughter Patricia recalls, "we gave up our garage." Rosie and Laura's children have given countless hours of volunteerism and efforts to help the poor and homeless. They even help Rosie make food pick-ups.

Yes, even at 97, Rosie continues to make food pick-ups and coordinates a small army of volunteers who also pick up donated food from local supermarkets, bakeries, and restaurants. Rosie can certainly tell some wonderful stories about our Dining Room Program.

Right now, Michael Acaldo, President & CEO of St. Vincent de Paul Charitable Programs said, "We have officially asked Rosie to quarantine for now. At first, Rosie didn't want to do it, but we explained to him that he was too important to us to be put at risk. That's why Rosie is in St. Vincent's Top Hat Award Hall of Fame, and won the Golden Deeds Award. He is willing to put his life on the line for others."

St. Vincent de Paul recognizes and thanks Rosie for his many decades of volunteer leadership and services. We congratulate him on this well-deserved award.

Our work is so important to people who would otherwise go hungry. Our Dining Room continues to serve between 200 and 450 people a day.



Our Bishop Ott Shelter Program continues to be a safety net for individuals and families that are homeless. As mentioned in our article entitled, "A Prayer for Sweet Dreams," without us, our guests would not have had a place to call home. Keeping our doors open is very important to many of our homeless guests who suffer from underlying disease and suppressed immune systems. Thanks to the wonderful work of our small staff, we have kept our doors open and people safe.



Finally, our pharmacy is filling prescriptions for those who currently rely on us for life-sustaining prescription medicine, as well as, those who have recently lost jobs and insurance because of this pandemic.

The hard part is just beginning for us. The fall and winter months are going to present additional COVID-19 challenges. Please keep our volunteers and small staff in your thoughts and prayers. God bless you for your support!
