Filling Prescriptions - Saving Lives

The everyday mission of our St. Vincent de Paul Community Pharmacy is to save lives. That powerful mission says a lot about our Fill a Prescription for the Needy efforts during this COVID-19 pandemic. Our pharmacy fills life-sustaining prescriptions, providing medicines for the underlying health conditions of high blood pressure, heart disease, diabetes and many other illnesses.

The pandemic and downturn in the economy are forcing more people to break tablets in half or skip doses of life-sustaining medicines in a desperate attempt to make ends meet. Every year, our pharmacy serves patients who cannot afford their critically needed medicines. That's why this effort, led by Pat Shingleton, WBRZ-Channel 2, and the Baton Rouge Clinic is so important.





Whether it's an individual who's fighting a life-threatening health condition and has lost their health insurance; a blue collar worker who has been affected by the decrease in jobs; a single mother struggling to raise her children; or

someone who lost their job during a recent lay-off, our pharmacy is truly the light at the end of the tunnel.

With so much suffering because of the pandemic, we know that this year's campaign will be a real challenge. People who go without their prescriptions experience worsening health and complications, and that is the last thing any of us want during the pandemic.

At one time or another, we have all seen someone who was impoverished or ill, especially during this pandemic. Our hearts go out to them. We may have thought, "There, but for the grace of God, go I." People who have had that same thought are now showing up at our pharmacy.

In the face of illness and adversity, you might think that faith would be weakened, or lost altogether. But we see faith that is stronger than ever - despite pain and suffering, lifethreatening diseases and financial hardship.
